Gospel Reflection: Christmas 2009

Readings: Heb: 1:1-12 & Lk 2:1-20

“She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn.” Luke 2:7

Does Luke’s version of Jesus’ birth differ from Matthew’s?

Yes. Our Christmas cards, carols, pageants, and crèche sets tend to interweave Luke and Matthew’s nativities, but each author presents his own distinctive take on Jesus’ birth.

When Jesus is born in Matthew’s Gospel, a star emblazons the sky, signaling dignitaries from exotic lands. These magi” embark on their long journey, taking up to two years to reach Jerusalem. Once there, their arrival wreaks havoc, as not only is King Herod troubled, but all Jerusalem. Plots are hatched. Calculations are made. Deals are struck. The magi continue onward, guided by the star. They find Jesus – at his house – and pay him homage with fantastic gifts. When they evade Herod, Herod launches a desperate assassination attempt. Warned by a dream, the holy family flees under cover of darkness to seek asylum in Egypt.

In Luke, Mary and Joseph are forced to travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem for a state census. Lost in a sea of humanity, they are denied even a spare room there. In the back alley of some hostel, Mary gives birth and must lay her child in a paltry feedbox. The entire event goes practically unnoticed, except when a few scruffy shepherds shuffle in from a neighboring field. Eight days later, the holy family returns to Nazareth, stopping briefly to offer their temple sacrifice.

These portrayals of Jesus’ birth differ radically in details, and they even seem contradictory. Matthew’s scene is portentous, dramatic, and politically-charged. Luke’s is humble, pedestrian, and unassuming. Each evangelist uses his story to convey who Jesus is and why he has come. For Matthew, Jesus is the King of the Jews, the long-awaited Messiah, whose dramatic arrival befits his royal status. For Luke, Jesus is the Son of God whose meager circumstances reflect his solidarity with even the most insignificant members of society.

Christmas Reflection: We've Lost Sight of Christmas

During the frenzied pace of the Christmas season, we tend to lose sight of the message and promise that Christmas heralds. So often we're caught up in getting ready for this's and last minute that's. We rush here. We push there, and practically run over people seeking that special gift which we really cannot afford.

Could all this hurrying and scurrying be Satan's vengeance against God, or his revenge against the Incarnation –the birth of the Son of God? Satan blinds us all with the glitter and gloss, sounds of bells tinkling and cash registers jingling. We've lost sight of the meaning of Christmas –the message of peace among all men and women, the promise of joy to everyone of good will.

Christmas' true splendor is found more often in simplicity –simplicity rooted in awareness and listening. For as we listen more to the world around us, we become increasingly aware of the troubles and pain, the anger and strain that men and women suffer. It is the message and promise of Christmas which can bring hope to the little, the lost and the least; to the bruised, the battered and the broken.

One of the greatest gifts we can bring to the world, bring to each man, woman or child we meet this Christmas season, is to "practice random kindness and senseless acts of beauty." I'm reminded of the B.C. comic strip from several years ago in which cartoonist Johnny Hart has the character Wiley searching for answers to one of life's great questions. It is a question so simple and yet so timely. In the first panel Wiley asks, "Whatever happened to kindness?" He then proceeds to write the following verse:

*"Why do people go to the trouble to give other people some trouble?
Why do they burst someone's bubble, when they know it comes back to them double?
Why do we go to the effort to hurt someone we actually love?
Why can't we say something sweet 'stead of curt? A push only leads to a shove.
Why can't we treat other folks with respect? With a smile or a kind word or two?
Treat them with honor, the way you'd expect they should act when they're dealing with you.
Why can't we overlook others' mistakes? We've all surely been there before.
Love and forgiveness is all that it takes, to boot Satan's butt out the door."*

This Christmas season, give a gift that will last, a gift that will endure long after you are gone. "Practice random kindness and senseless acts of beauty." Go ahead, try it! It will shock you only a bit. I'm sure it will astound others, too, and I am certain it will startle the world around you. Go ahead, practice kindness anyway. The world could use a jolt such as this.

Lower Your Income Tax before the End of the Year

One way to lower your income tax bill for this year is to make charitable contributions, which can be deducted from your income when you itemize deductions on your 2009 Income Tax Return. Gifts made to charities, such as Our Lady of Lebanon Church, are tax deductible. It is important that you keep in mind that in order for you to claim the deduction on your tax return for 2009, **your gift must be received by the church and your check must be dated on or before December 31st, 2009.**

By the end of January 2010, those who made donations of \$250 or more will automatically receive from Our Lady of Lebanon Church a statement acceptable to the IRS stating the donor(s) name and the amount donated –through checks or weekly offering envelopes– from January 1st, 2009, through December 31st, 2009. This statement should be kept with your tax records, in case the IRS audits your return. *Note: The IRS will only accept cancelled checks or church statements as proof of your contributions.*

Poor Box

Please consider sharing your blessings with the brothers and sisters of Christ. Some are in dire need some are not, but God alone knows what's in each one's heart. The Poor Box is located at the rear of the church near the Holy Water Font. Half of the money from that box is deposited in our "Parish Families Assistance Fund" to assist the poor families in our parish; and the other half is given to Catholic Charity on 18th Street, in Wheeling to be used for the poor and homeless. Christmas Story: Saint Nicholas

(died in 342 AD)

Better known to children everywhere as Santa Claus, Saint Nicholas is one of the oldest official saints of the Catholic Church. In the early 4th century, Nicholas served as the Bishop of Myra, a Mediterranean city today known as Demre. Saint Nicholas attended the Council of Nicea in 325, which is credited for instituting the Nicene Creed, an early predecessor of the creed currently said at Mass.

Saint Nicholas is believed to have first become associated with Christmas because his feast date, like that of the Immaculate Conception, is close to the beginning of the Season. His link to the tradition of gift giving comes from a popular story. In Myra, there was a family of three daughters who were so poor that between them they did not have enough money for even one dowry, so none of them could marry. The eldest offered to sell herself into slavery to at least earn a dowry for the other two. On hearing of this, Nicholas anonymously sent three gifts of money to the family over three years. It is said that the first time he did so the money was thrown down the chimney, creating the myth of Santa Claus and chimneys.

Following Nicholas' death in 342, he became the subject of popular devotion and many stories spread of his miracles. Today we recognize Saint Nicholas not only as the mythical Santa Claus, but also as the patron saint of children.

Reflections: To Be With Christ

I remembered a village priest in Province who went to the waiting room of the nearby railway junction every night when most people were in bed, because there the lonely gathered, men who had no home, men who could not face home because of what they had done, men who could not speak to any woman but a prostitute, men and women who were failures because of their own fault or someone else's fault or nobody's fault. He knew Christ must be there; and he wished to be where Christ was, to make visible to these people the Christ Whom they could not see, to take their suffering and their sin upon him, as Christ was, to pray for them, as Christ prayed. The year after that we were blessed with a daughter. My husband thought we'd been blessed right into poverty. We now had four children, and the oldest was only four years old. I learned never to ask God for anything unless I meant it. As a priest once told me, "If you pray for rain, make sure you carry an umbrella."

I began reading a few verses of the Bible to the children each day as they lay in their cribs. I was off to a good start. God had entrusted me with four children and I didn't want to disappoint Him. I tried to be patient the day the children smashed two dozen eggs on the kitchen floor searching for baby chicks. I tried to be understanding when they started a hotel for homeless frogs in the spare bedroom, although took me nearly two hours to catch all twenty-three frogs. When my daughter poured ketchup all over herself and rolled up in a blanket to see how it felt to be a hot dog, I tried to see the humor rather than the mess. In spite of changing over twenty-five thousand diapers, never eating a hot meal and never sleeping for more than thirty minutes at a time, I still thank God daily for my children. While I couldn't keep my promise to be a perfect mother—I didn't even come close—I did keep my promise to raise them in the Word of God. I knew I was missing the mark just a little when I told my daughter we were going to church to worship God, and she wanted to bring a bar of soap along to "wash up" Jesus, too. Something was lost in the translation when I explained that God gave us everlasting life, and my son thought it was generous of God to give us His "Last wife." My proudest moment came during the children's Christmas pageant. My daughter was playing Mary, two of my sons were shepherds and my youngest son was a wise man. This was their moment to shine. My five-year-old shepherd had practiced his line, "We found the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes." But he was nervous and said, "The baby was wrapped in wrinkled clothes." My four-year-old "Mary" said, "That's not wrinkled clothes, silly. That's dirty, rotten clothes." A wrestling match broke out between Mary and the shepherd and was stopped by an angel, who bent her halo and lost her left wing. I slouched a little lower in my seat when Mary dropped the doll representing baby Jesus, and it bounced down the aisle crying. "Mama-Mama." Mary grabbed the doll, wrapped it back up and held it tightly as the wise men arrived.

My other son stepped forward wearing a bathrobe and a paper crown, knelt at the manger and announced, "We are the Three Wise Men, and we are bringing gifts of gold, common sense, and fur." The congregation dissolved into laughter, and the pageant got a standing ovation. "I've never enjoyed a Christmas program as much this one," the priest laughed, wiping tears from his eyes.
