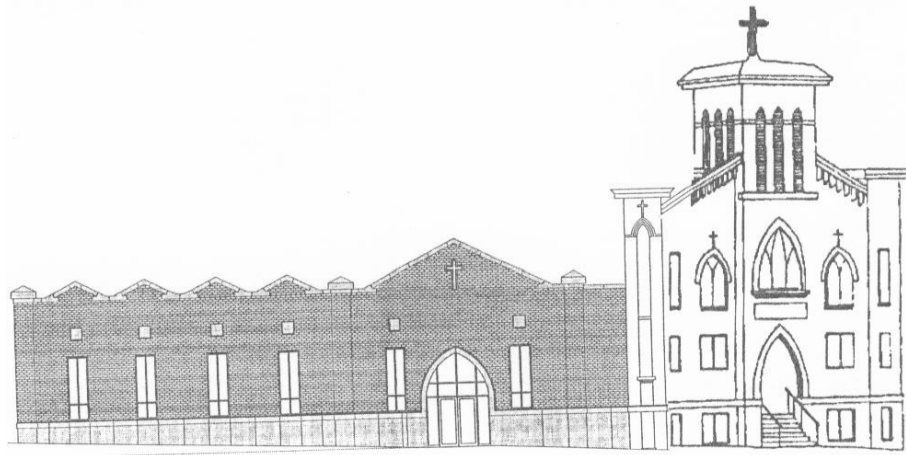

Gospel Reflection

Readings: 1Cor 2:11-16 and Lk 10:21-24

“At that same hour Jesus rejoiced in the Holy Spirit and said, “I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants.” (Luke 10:21-24)

Folk wisdom tells us that there are certain people who are very smart but don't have a lick of common sense. Put another way, we all know intelligent people who have done stupid things; we have all been such people. Folk wisdom has likewise taught us to say, “Out of the mouths of babes...” when a child clearly sees truth while the “adults” get lost in trivial details.

Robert Fulghum parlayed today's Scripture quote into a literary bestseller with the title, *All I Really Needed To Know, I Learned in Kindergarten*. Perhaps it would be helpful to list a few of the things that God has revealed to infants:

- 1- It is all right to cry out for help. Too soon in life, asking for help is seen as a sign of weakness.
- 2- We do not need to know what hurts; we just need to let others know that we hurt. Those who love us will either remove the hurt or share its pain with us.
- 3- Sometimes a hug makes everything better.
- 4- Sleep cures most problems. In that regard, the art of nap-taking needs to be rediscovered. This lesson alone has the power to change the world. Just imagine how much good would be done if one meeting every day was replaced with a nap.

Maronites! Who Are They?

***Maronites = Catholics of the East; Latins = Catholics of the West. We are all Catholics.
Antioch, Roots of the Maronites (2)***

Ignatius was the earliest proponent for an ecclesiastical hierarchy revolving around the singular authority of the bishop. In his presentation, the bishop's ministry was fulfilled with the necessary assistance of deacons and presbyters – a threefold ministry. Ignatius argued that what makes Christians a *church*, what lifts them from being a group of believers into being the body of Christ, is the presence and activity of a bishop. In and through the person of the bishop, Ignatius declared, Christ himself was present. Moreover, the model for the relationship between believers and clergy was that divinely instituted by Christ: the church was to the bishop as Jesus Christ was to God the Father, the presbyters stood in the place of the apostles, and the deacons stood as images of God's commandments. Nothing pertaining to the church was to be done apart from the bishop.

According to Ignatius only those sacramental activities performed by a bishop or committed by him to the hands of another official were valid baptism, Eucharist, agape-feast, and solemnizing of marriage. Allegiance and obedience to the bishop should be the source of Christian unity, as well as a protection against division.

To the episcopacy, as a divinely instituted office, Ignatius added the charismatic authority of prophetic teaching. Describing his own Episcopal leadership, he refers to incidents of teaching in which he also spoke under divine inspiration in ecstatic utterance. Thus, in Ignatius's view, the bishop represents in his person both the charismatic ministry of Paul and the apostolic authority of Peter, offering the direct revelation of God as well as the historical witness of the church.

Such was the view that would ultimately prevail for the Catholic and Orthodox churches. But in the early second century, as Ignatius traveled overland from Antioch to Rome, a diversity of Christian organizations and practices surrounded him. His was voice for uniformity of worship and belief, of structure and activity, in the midst of a bewildering array of different types of Christian communities. Long after his death, his letters would provide a major tool (and indeed a vision) for unifying churches across the empire.

Ignatius's letters not only defined the meaning of Episcopal office but also further demarcated the dominant themes in what would become a distinctively Antiochene theological tradition. Clearly, just as diversity characterized early Christian communities in their organization, many versions of Christian teaching circulated during the second century. Some were characterized by Gnostic or docetic views – that Christ was a divine savior who had appeared to his followers in the likeness of a human being but whose humanity had been a mere illusion, as had his death on the cross. Others expressed views closer to traditional patterns of Judaism – that Jesus was a pious man who was divinely inspired, perhaps like the prophets of old.

Ignatius sought to articulate a Christian faith that defined its truth over and against such understandings. He argued that Jesus Christ was truly the Son and Word of God in terms that in no way compromised the monotheistic claims of Christianity. More than this, he insisted repeatedly on the full integrity of Christ's humanity, claiming that if Christ's birth, suffering, death, and resurrection were not real, then he himself had no reason to suffer martyrdom in witness. Insistence on the fullness of Christ's humanity no less than his divine Sonship would become the hallmark of Antiochene theology; in Ignatius we find an early and eloquent expression of this teaching that laid the foundations for later doctrine. *(To be continued)*

When he looked up from his despairing plea for help, he saw a spider beginning to weave its web at the entrance to the cave. He thought, "I asked God for protection and deliverance, and He sent me a spider instead. How can a spider save me?"

His heart was hardened, knowing the enemy would soon discover his hiding place and kill him. Soon he did hear the sound of his enemies, who were now scouring the area looking for those in hiding.

One soldier with a gun slowly walked up to the cave's entrance. As the young man crouched in the darkness, hoping to surprise the enemy in a last-minute desperate attempt to save his own life, he felt his heart pounding wildly out of control. As the enemy cautiously moved forward to enter the cave, he came upon the spider's web, which by now was completely strung across the opening. He backed away and called out to a comrade, "There can't be anyone in here. They would have had to break this spider's web to enter the cave. Let's move on."

Years later, this young man, who made good his promise by becoming a preacher and evangelist, wrote about that ordeal. What he observed has stood by me in times of trouble, especially during those times when everything seemed impossible: "Where God is, a spider's web is as a stone wall. Where God is not, a stone wall is as a spider's web."
