

Gospel Reflection: Announcement to Mary

Scripture Readings: Gal 3:15-22 and Lk 1:26-38

'The Mother of All the Living'

"The man called his wife Eve, because she became the mother of all the living." Genesis 3:20 What does *"Eve"* as a woman's name mean in English?

What does "Eve" as a woman's name mean in English?

"Eve" is simply the English transliteration of her name in Hebrew: *chawwah*. The actual derivation of this name is uncertain. The ancient Israelite writer who composed the Adam and Eve story in its present form—scholars refer to this anonymous individual as the "Yahwist," because he identifies God by the divine name, YHWH—delighted in spicing up his stories with wordplays.

The man's explanation for Eve's name is one example of this. The Hebrew word for "living" is chay, which comes from the verb chayah, to live. Say them out loud together and you'll catch the pun: chawwah, chay(ah). Get it? The naming of Eve is a significant moment in the story, because she is the sole creature whose unique gift the man has not yet been able to fathom. According to Genesis 2:1 8-20, the man gave names to every other "help" God devised for him as soon as they were created.

It is only after the forbidden fruit has made the man and woman aware of their sexual difference (Gn 3:7) and God has unveiled procreation as the means by which human life will be perpetuated (Gn 3:16) that the man solves this mystery, making the connection between the woman and life.

Update on the Steeple Project

Walters Construction started this project on Tuesday, July 9th. Its cost is \$135,000. The steeple is constructed in the Fulton shop and transported to our parking lot for roofing work. The brick work is completed on the three towers. The 6-foot golden cross donated by Dr. Al Ghaphery and his Family members has arrived in Wheeling. The carpenters finished the soffits and the painter painted them. Very soon, the steeple will be lifted up by a huge crane and installed into its place with the cross on top of it. All parishioners are invited to take a picture with Msgr. Bakhos and the parish council when the crane lifts up the steeple from the ground. You will be informed about the day and time.

A fundraising project is now underway and a Plaque in the shape of the original church will commemorate the donors' names. Please consider becoming a benefactor of this project by sponsoring one or more "Cap Stones" with a tax deductible donation of \$500 for each stone or sponsoring one or more "Bricks" with a donation of \$100.00 each. In addition to the net profit of the festival, the total amount received and pledges toward the steeple so far: **\$128,051.00 out of \$135,000.00**. We paid Walters Construction **\$105,680.39 toward the steeple so far.**

Christmas Reflection: Christmas in Holland

In Holland the exchange of gifts takes place very early -on Saint Nicholas Eve, December 5th. At that time Saint Nicholas and his servant, Black Peter, visit homes to leave gifts for children. In each house there are presents and wonderful food- candies, cakes, plenty of hot chocolate and gingerbread men in the shape of Saint Nicholas.

He wears the red cap and cape, and he has a white beard. (The Dutch call him *Sinter Klass*, and the American word "Santa Claus" comes from the Dutch pronunciation.) He arrives by boat in the harbor of Amsterdam, where he is greeted by the mayor. He rides into town on a white horse, and Black Peter is nearby with a sack over his shoulder and a birch rod in his hand.

Christmas Eve and Christmas morning are devoted to church services. Later in the day there is a feast, and the children go ice skating on the frozen canals.

Christmas Story

This morning I heard a story on the radio of a woman who was out Christmas shopping with her two children; after many hours of looking at row after row of toys and everything else imaginable, and after hours of hearing both her children asking for everything they saw on those many shelves, she finally made it to the elevator with her two kids. She was feeling what so many of us feel during the holiday season time of the year-overwhelming pressure to go to every party, every housewarming, taste all the holiday food and treats, get that perfect gift for every single person on our shopping list, make sure we don't forget anyone on our card list, and the pressure of making sure we respond to everyone who sent us a card.

Finally the elevator doors opened and there was already a crowd in the car. She pushed her way into the car and dragged her two kids in with her and all the bags of stuff. When the doors closed she couldn't take it anymore and stated, "Whoever started this whole Christmas thing should be found, strung up and shot."

From the back of the car everyone heard a quiet, calm voice respond, "Don't worry. We already crucified him."
