Sunday of the Leper

Readings: 2 Kings 5:1-14; Rom 6:12-23 and Mk 1:35-43

When Jesus lived, leprosy was not just an incurable physical ailment: it amounted to social and religious death. Moreover, it was viewed as the severest sentence that God passed on the sinner. Isaiah depicts the guilty people of God as lepers, and he uses this imagery also to describe the mysterious servant who expiates Israel's sin.

The meeting between Jesus and the leper thus becomes highly significant. Impurity meets up with the "Holy"; the outcast meets the Servant, Himself a future outcast; leprosy which defiles comes into contact with the one who makes pure. Here sin confronts its choicest victim, evil its cure. In the person of this leper the Savior touches and purifies the whole sinful world. Thus, in spite of the injunction to secrecy, the religious authorities to which Jesus sent the man He had just cured should have recognized that the Messiah had come and that through Him the social outcasts and the living-dead had rehabilitated.

In differing degrees the lepers of today are the various outcasts of our society. These are the incurable invalids we shut away in hospitals and forget about; they are those who live on the margins of our society in subhuman conditions, and the others rejected by our society for one reason or another. We must learn from Jesus. Each of us is leprous; each of us has a hidden uncleanness, which we need to reveal to Jesus, in order to obtain healing and wholeness from Him and to be readmitted into the society of the saved. Once we have been touched and cleansed, we must proclaim God's Word and, following Jesus' example, welcome in their human dignity those who before were cast out or rejected.

Story: Mother's escort

Although Mother raised two children during the fifties and sixties, there was another child she could never forget. Mark was a beautiful red-headed baby who entered the world a month prematurely. He struggled to breathe from the beginning. Six hours after his birth, he gasped his last breath.

One of Mother's greatest regrets was never having held her baby son while he was alive. She was still in the hospital on the day of Mark's funeral, so my dad carried the little coffin into her hospital room for her to say goodbye. A mother can never forget the love of her child, and so it was with my mother. She got on with her

life, but when people asked her how many children she had, she usually answered “three.” So as teenagers, when my brother and I bought her a mother’s ring, we made sure there were three stones surrounding her ruby birthstone; two diamonds, to represent the April birthdays of her living children and the “aquamarine” for Mark’s March birthday.

When my mother was ninety-four, she broke her hip. She stayed in the hospital three weeks, but then returned home, living independently by late April. In early May, she called me one day, her voice full of joy.

“Margaret, when I woke up this morning, there was a tall, handsome, red—haired man standing beside my bed,” she said. I was immediately flooded with peace and joy. I knew instantly that it was Mark. He told me, ‘It won’t be long. I will be coming for you.’” She repeated the story to my brother a few weeks later while they visited Mark’s grave at the cemetery on Memorial Day.

Mother steadily improved, and I forgot about Mark’s visit. Mother, however, started putting her affairs in order, wanting to sell her rental property, emptying closets, and repeatedly saying she wanted to clean out her house and have a rummage sale.

In mid-August, Mother fell and needed hospitalization; in early September she experienced a stroke. When she could not speak, she would often gaze upon the mother’s ring we had given her. On December 8, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, she was humming “Joy to the World with some carolers as she sat eating supper at 6 p.m. Within the hour, she had passed away.

The next day at the funeral home, the funeral director handed me a small black bag containing Mother’s jewelry. As I opened the bag and her Mother’s ring fell into my hand, all at once I remembered Mother’s visitor. I realized Mark had come for her. It was a comfort to know she did not leave this world alone.
