Gospel Reflection: Palm Sunday or Hosanna Sunday

Readings: Zech 9:9-17; Phil 1:1-13 and Jn 12:12-22

“Many spread their garments”

“Instead of our garments, let us spread our hearts before him.” (Methodius).

“Others spread leafy branches”

And others cut boughs... and strewed them in the way. They cut branches from the fruit bearing trees with which the Mount of Olives was planted, and spread them in the way; so as to make the crooked ways straight, and the rough ways smooth, that Christ the conqueror of sin might walk straightly and safely into the hearts of the faithful... And when they had done all that was to be done by their hands, they offered also the tribute of their voices; and going before and following after they cry, not in a brief and wordless confession, but with all their might: *“Hosanna to the Son of David. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord”* (Jerome).

Why Hosanna!

The boys in the Gospel raised aloft their branches as the Savior entered Jerusalem. They kept on crying: *“Hosanna.”*... They borrowed these vesicles from Psalm 117. *Hosanna*, moreover, is the Hebrew for *“O Lord, grant salvation!”* (Jerome)

Meditation for Lent

“Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and sustain in me a willing spirit.” (Psalm 51:12)

Joy does not come from positive predictions about the state of the world. Joy does not depend on the ups and downs of the circumstances of our lives. Joy is based on the spiritual knowledge that, while the world in which we live is shrouded in darkness, God has overcome the world. Jesus says it loudly and clearly: *“In the world you will have troubles, but rejoice, I have overcome the world.”*

The surprise is not that, unexpectedly, things turn out better than expected. No, the real surprise is that God’s light is more real than all the darkness, that God’s truth is more powerful than all human lies, that God’s love is stronger than death.

Lord, help me to see that I don’t have to overcome the troubles of the world by myself. Help me trust in what Jesus has already done.

Miracles of Jesus (9, 10 & 11)

Miracle #9 of Jesus when he healed and forgave a Man Who Could Not Walk

Jesus stepped into a boat. He went over to the other side of the lake and came to his own town. Some men brought to him a man who could not walk. He was lying on a mat. Jesus saw that they had faith. So, he said to the man, *“Don’t lose hope, son. Your sins are forgiven.”* Then some teachers of the law said to themselves, *“This fellow is saying a very evil thing!”* Jesus knew what they were thinking. So, he said, *“Why do you have evil thoughts in your hearts? Is it easier to say, ‘Your sins are forgiven’? Or to say, ‘Get up and walk’? But I want you to know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins.”* So, he spoke to the man who could not walk. *“Get up,”* he said. *“Take your mat and go home.”* The man got up and went home. When the crowd saw this, they were filled with wonder. They praised God for giving that kind of authority to a human being. (Matthew 9:1-8)

Story of the miracle #10 of Jesus when he healed a man’s withered hand

Going on from that place, Jesus went into their synagogue. A man with a weak and twisted hand was there. The Pharisees were trying to accuse Jesus of a crime. So, they asked him, *“Does the Law allow us to heal on the Sabbath day?”* He said to them, *“What if one of your sheep falls into a pit on the Sabbath day? Won’t you take hold of it and lift it out? A person is worth more than sheep! So, the Law allows us to do good on the Sabbath day.”* Then Jesus said to the man, *“Stretch out your hand.”* So, he stretched it out. It had been made as good as new. It was just as good as the other hand. But the Pharisees went out and planned how to kill Jesus.

(Matthew 12:9-14)

The 11th miracle of Jesus when he raises a Widow’s Son from the Dead

Sometime later, Jesus went to a town called Nain. His disciples and a large crowd went along with him. He approached the town gate. Just then, a dead person was being carried out. He was the only son of his mother. She was a widow. A large crowd from the town was with her. When the Lord saw her, he felt sorry for her. So, he said, "Don't cry." Then he went up and touched the coffin. Those carrying it stood still. Jesus said, "Young man, I say to you, get up!" The dead man sat up and began to talk. Then Jesus gave him back to his mother. The people were all filled with wonder and praised God. "A great prophet has appeared among us," they said. "God has come to help his people." This news about Jesus spread all through Judea and the whole country. (Luke 7:11-17)
